Understand the Process

- Depositions are formal sessions where attorneys ask questions under oath.
- Present are attorneys, a court reporter, and sometimes opposing parties.
- Your testimony is recorded and may be used at trial.

Review Relevant Documents

- Revisit contracts, correspondence, financial records, or other documents tied to the dispute.
- Work with your attorney to identify key materials.

Work with Your Attorney

- Schedule preparation sessions to review likely questions.
- Conduct mock Q&A; to practice concise, accurate answers.
- Identify themes and facts central to your testimony.

Answering Questions Effectively

- Listen carefully before responding.
- Keep answers clear and concise.
- Do not speculate—only testify to what you personally know.
- Pause to think before answering to avoid mistakes.

Avoid Common Pitfalls

- Do not volunteer extra information beyond the question.
- Avoid guessing or making assumptions.
- Stay calm and avoid defensiveness, even if questions are aggressive.

Professional Demeanor

Dress appropriately for a formal setting.

- Speak clearly and respectfully.
- Maintain composure throughout the deposition.

Day-of Deposition Checklist

- Bring valid identification.
- Only bring documents approved by your attorney.
- Get a full night's rest and arrive early.
- Follow instructions from your legal team.
